Commanders Log

The April meeting was well attended; with one of the largest drawings in recent history. We had five of the seven 2013 Holland Club Awardees present. Frank Kenyon again exceeded all expectations, and did a great job of making introductions and presenting the Certificates. We also announced the cost for the Business Card Newsletter advertising program for a suggested donation of \$20.00 for 12 issues. You should have already received a Flyer for the program. Keep in mind the upcoming Armed Forces Day Parade in Hawthorne on May 18th. This is our first parade outing of the year. Pete Anderson (YN) will generously donate the fuel costs to pull our Sub Float. We would like enough participation to make the trip worthwhile.

Speaking of the Holland Club, it's namesake the USS Holland was purchased by the Navy on April 11, 1900. That is the official start/anniversary date of the US Submarine Force which is 113 years old this month. The Holland VI was purchased for \$150,000, after five previous developmental versions. It displaced 64 tons, about 54 feet long, and powered by a gasoline engine on surface (6 kts), and batteries submerged. They had one 18 inch torpedo tube , with three torpedoes. We have come a long way since then. The commissioning was on October 12, 1900 as the SS-1. It was "Gasoline Boats Forever" until the Navy adopted diesel engines in 1909. (I never did see one of those **GBF** patches; probably lost in the explosion/fire.) The rest is history. The newest *boat*, the USS Minnesota (SSN-783), is scheduled to be commissioned on September 7, 2013 in Norfolk. It's the 10th boat of the Virginia Class, costs about \$2 Billion, displaces 7800 tons, 377 feet long, and needless to say, has a lot more fire-power. **NBF!** (These patches are still available, but they glow in the dark.)

Coming up in May is the Mustang Battalion NJROTC awards ceremony at the Damonte Ranch High School in South Reno. We will award our annual "Pride Runs Deep" award to a deserving Cadet. This is always a fun event to attend, and it's great to see young people doing something productive. Watch for the announcement next month.

Don Brown: Don, who is the Corvina Base Treasurer and a Past Base Commander, caused concern for the Corvina Base recently when he spent four days at Renown Hospital in Reno, NV. Don said he had never spent more than one day in a hospital before so this was something new and different. Don had just arrived back home Thursday, April 11, from a four day Southwest Regional Conference USSVI in Laughlin, NV and went to bed, but couldn't breathe properly. At 3:00 A.M. Friday morning his wife Terry took him to emergency and found out his heart was only working at 35 percent. His lungs were full of fluid and the doctors diagnosed it as congestive heart failure. It was not a heart attack. He will be going through some testing, such as an angiogram, and then the doctors will be determining what kind of treatment is needed. Our prayers are with you, Don and Terry during this time of testing in the trials of life.

Eternal Patrol

Gerald "Jerry" Stratton: Jerry passed away in Alturas, CA on February 19, 2013 at the age of 82. He and his wife, Emiko, had lived in Alturas since 1986. They never had children so they doted on their dogs and cats. Jerry and Emiko met and married in Yokohama, Japan, on October 10, 1961. Born in San Jose, CA on November 21, 1930 and at the age of 18 joined the US Navy and became a submarine sailor. He served for 20 years, retiring as a chief Engine-man ENC(SS) on October 25, 1965. His family said he was very proud to be a submariner and enjoyed boat reunions with former shipmates. Jerry qualified on the USS Blenny (SS-324) in 1948 and also served on the USS Blueback (SS-581), USS Cusk (SS/SSG-348), USS Carbonero (SS-337), and a reserve boat in Long Beach the USS Roncador (SS/AGSS -301). After retiring from the Navy, Jerry worked in Law Enforcement with the State of CA in Long Beach, assigned at the Queen Mary, CA State University Dominguez Hills in Carson, CA for 20 more years and then relocated to Alturas CA. In Alturas he worked for the Modoc County Sheriff's Office and also worked as a locksmith for 17 years. His hobbies were hunting and fishing, especially deep sea fishing, until bladder cancer took his life. At his request, no services will be held, but Jerry will be honored at the Veterans Cemetery in Fernley, NV at the annual Corvina Base Memorial Service in September. "Sailor, rest your oars, we've got the watch"

Memorial Day

This year's Memorial Day ceremony, to be held at the Fernley Veterans Cemetery is to be held on Monday, May 27, at 11:00 A.M. The Corvina Base had several members attend last year and it was a positive experience. The ceremony has grown in attendance over the last few years with plenty of seating and shade awnings for sunny days (or rainy). In January the National Cemetery Administration of the federal VA awarded the "Excellence of Appearance Award" to the Veterans' Memorial Cemetery Fernley. Wes Block cemetery superintendent, and his team have done an outstanding job to make the cemetery functional for all of us vets and it always looks beautiful. This year there is an added feature because the Dept. of Defense is launching a decade-long celebration and remembrance of the end of combat in Vietnam 40 years ago. The Nevada National Guard is to host Nevada's first event at our Fernley cemetery with the Ghost Soldiers veterans' motorcycle club unveiling their latest memorial on the cemetery grounds. The Corvina Base donated \$100 to help pay for this memorial. This one honors Nevadans in the Vietnam War following the traditional Memorial Day ceremony. Some of this information came from Caleb S. One fellow was rather young and had his wife riding along in the golf cart with him. I noticed that his golf bag had his name on it and after closer inspection it also said "wounded war veterans". When I had my first chance to chat with him I asked him about the bag.

His response was simply that it was a gift. I then asked if he was wounded and he said yes. When I asked more about his injury, his re-sponse was "I'd rather not talk about it, sir". Over a few holes I learned that he had spent the last 15 months in an army rehabilitation hospital in San Antonio

Texas . His wife moved there to be with him and he was released from the hospital in September. He was a rather quiet fellow; however, he did say that he wanted to get good at golf. We had a nice round and as we became a bit more familiar I asked him about the brand new set of Ping woods and irons he was playing. Some looked like they had never been hit. His response was simple. He said that this round was the first full round he had played with these clubs.

Later in the round he told me the following. As part of the discharge process from the rehabilitation hospital, Ping comes in and provides three days of golf instruction, followed by club fitting. Upon discharge from the hospital, Ping gives each of the discharged veterans, generally about 40 soldiers, a brand new set of custom fitted clubs along with the impressive golf bags.

The fellow I met was named Ben Woods and he looked me in the eye and said that being fitted for those clubs was one of the best things that ever happened to him and he was determined to learn to play golf well enough to deserve the gift Ping had given him. Ben is now out of the service medically discharged just a month ago. He is as fine a young man as you would ever want to meet.

Ping, whose products are made with pride here in America (Arizona), has the good judgment not to advertise this program. God Bless America and the game of golf.

History of USS SCORPION:

This is the 45 anniversary of her loss

USS SCORPION was laid down on 20 August 1958 by the Electric Boat Division, General Dynamics Corp., Groton, Conn.; launched on 19 December 1959; sponsored by Mrs. Elizabeth S. Morrison; and commissioned on 29 July 1960, Comdr. Norman B. Bessac in command.

Assigned to Submarine Squadron 6, Division 62, SCORPION departed New London, Conn., on 24 August for a two-month deployment in European waters. During that period, she participated in exercises with units of the 6th Fleet and of other NATO navies. After returning to New England in late October, she trained along the eastern seaboard until May 1961, then crossed the Atlantic again for operations which took her into the summer. On 9 August, she returned to New London and, a month later, shifted to Norfolk, Va.

With Norfolk her home port for the remainder of her career, SCORPION specialized in the development of nuclear submarine warfare tactics. Varying her role from hunter to hunted, she participated

in exercises which ranged along the Atlantic coast and in the Bermuda and Puerto Rican operating areas; then, from June 1963 to May 1964, she interrupted her operations for an overhaul at Charleston, S.C. Resuming duty off the eastern seaboard in late spring, she again interrupted that duty from 4 August to 8 October to make a transatlantic patrol. In the spring of 1965, she conducted a similar patrol.

During the late winter and early spring of 1966, and again in the fall, she was deployed for special operations. Following the completion of those assignments, her commanding officer received the Navy Commendation Medal for outstanding leadership, foresight, and professional skill. Other SCORPION officers and men were cited for meritorious achievement.

On 1 February 1967, SCORPION entered the Norfolk Naval Shipyard for another extended overhaul. In late October, she commenced refresher training and weapons system acceptance tests. Following type training out of Norfolk, she got underway on 15 February 1968 for a Mediterranean deployment. She operated with the 6th Fleet, into May, then headed west. On 21 May, she indicated her position to be about 50 miles south of the Azores. Six days later, she was reported overdue at Norfolk.

A search was initiated, but, on 5 June, SCORPION and her crew were declared "presumed lost." Her name was struck from the Navy list on 30 June.

The search continued, however; and, at the end of October, the Navy's oceanographic research ship, MIZAR (T-AGOR 11) located sections of SCORPION's hull in more than 10,000 feet of water about 400 miles southwest of the Azores. Subsequently, the Court of Inquiry was reconvened and other vessels, including the submersible TRIESTE were dispatched to the scene, but, despite the myriad of data and pictures collected and studied, the cause of the loss remains a mystery.




Photo # USN 1136658 Bow of sunken USS Scorpion









Holland Club members are those submarine veterans of USSVI (United States Submarine Veterans, Inc.) that qualified on a submarine 50 or more years ago. When qualified, a sailor earns the right to wear, and responsibility of, the dolphin insignia of submarine service.
